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



MORE OPPORTUNITIES:

Translation grants are available for shortlisted and winning Literature and Children's titles.

Literature and Children's Titles

The Sheikh Zayed Book Award launched the translation fund initiative in 2018 to promote the spread of Arabic literature around the world, as the initiative provides financial funding of up to 19,000 US dollars per winning title and is available to all publishing houses working to publish books in foreign languages.

Funding is available for translation of all literature and children's titles that have won the Sheikh Zayed Book Award, as well as shortlisted literature and children's titles starting in 2021.

TRANSLATION GRANTS

SZBA's translation grant aims to increase the number of Arabic books that are translated, published and distributed abroad. Funding is available for translation of all literary and children's titles that have won or have been shortlisted for the Sheikh Zayed Book Award.



DEADLINE:

Applications are accepted all year round. Notification is made after 2-3 months of application date.

FORMAL REQUIREMENTS:

- The applicant must be a publisher in a country other than the Middle East
- The signed contract between the publisher and rights holder for the Arabic edition, and between the publisher and translator must be included.
- Funding is available to world languages. The
 translation shall normally be carried out directly
 from Arabic. An exception can be made in the
 event of special circumstances, such as a lack of
 qualified translators from Arabic or that the book
 is already translated to English. SZBA may in some
 cases review the quality of the translation before the
 translation fund is paid.
- The quality of the book must be of an acceptable calibre and a quality assessment will be carried out by SZBA Scientific committee. The applicant must submit a promotional plan to the translated work.

SUPPORT MATERIALS:

- Brief profile of your press and publishing mandate
- Budget
- · Promotional plan
- An up-to-date biography of the translator(s), including relevant translation and publication credits

GRANT AMOUNT:

A maximum of approximately US\$19,000 per title; plus a supplement, if applicable, to cover specific promotion and production costs:

- Translation-related costs, up to a maximum of US\$10,000 per title.
- For translations of literary works, the cost of promoting the translated book, up to a maximum of US\$5,000 per translated title
- For translations of illustrated books containing at least 50% photos and/or illustrations (e.g. children's books, graphic novels, illustrated books etc.), production costs per translated title of up to US\$4,000 and promotion costs per translated title of up to US\$4,000

PAYMENTS:

If your application is approved, you will then need to register as a supplier with the Department of Finance, Abu Dhabi (instructions will be provided to you).

Payment will be provided upon the completion and submission of a final copy of the translated work to the Award's Officer.

DECISION PROCESS:

The Scientific Committee of the Sheikh Zayed Book Award reviews all grant applications and makes the final decision about which applications to approve.





The novel "Al-Halawani" is a historical narrative that delves into a significant period in the life of the Arab history, when the region faced the challenges of the Crusader attacks, the emergence of heroes, and the endurance of severe hardships. The novel is divided into three stories.

The first story recounts the arrival of the Fatimids in Egypt from Tunisia and the life history of the leader Jawhar Al-Siqilli, who built the city of Cairo. The second story is about the Al-Mustansiriya Famine or the famines that occurred in Egypt during the time of the Fatimid Caliph Al-Mustansir and how they ravaged the Egyptian population until the leader Badr Al-Jamali came to save Egypt from the famine, re-dividing its provinces, and building the current walls of Cairo. In the third story, the novel touches on the rise to power of Salah Al-Din Al-Ayyubi, the escalating threat of the Crusaders, and the end of the Fatimid state in Egypt.

The novel depicts also the role of Arab women in confronting the Crusaders and enduring famines and dangers.


ABOUT THE AUTHOR:

Dr. Reem Bassiouney is an Egyptian author, as well as a professor and chair of the linguistics department at the American University in Cairo since 2013. She previously worked as an assistant professor of linguistics at Georgetown University (2007-2013) and as a lecturer of linguistics at the University of Utah (2005-2007), in addition to teaching at the University of Oxford and the University of Cambridge (2002-2005), and serving as a member of the judging panels for the Excellence in Literature Award 2024 from the Supreme Council of Culture, as well as the International Prize for Arabic Fiction (IPAF) in 2023.

Dr. Bassiouney holds a PhD in sociolinguistics from the University of Oxford (2002), a master's



degree in sociolinguistics from the University of Oxford (1998), and a bachelor's degree in English from Alexandria University (1994). She has garnered acclaim by notable critics from Egypt, other Arab countries, and around the world. Dr. Bassiouney has authored a collection of novels, which were all published in several editions. Most of her works topped the best-seller list and were translated by Dr. Roger Allen, who also worked on the novels of Naguib Mahfouz.



This autobiographical work centers on literary creativity. Poet Ali Jaafar Alallaq recollects his academic and professional experiences, as well as their diverse ventures into poetic, literary, critical, and academic writing earlier in his life. The book covers the poet's upbringing in a humble, impoverished village, his family's subsequent move to Baghdad in the early 1950s, and his journey up until the present day.


The biography details a plethora of human, cultural, and poetic events that impacted Alallaq's perspective on events he witnessed, interacted with, or was involved in. These events range in intensity and scope, spanning from his childhood years in the countryside to navigating significant societal changes in Baghdad, and from his early explorations in writing and literary journalism to pursuing doctoral studies in the United Kingdom. He reflects on enduring two destructive wars that displaced Iraq's people, leading to a life of exile and reliance on divine providence under the night sky.

Beginning in 1991, Alallaq began a long period abroad that included six years of teaching at Sanaa University, followed by ten years of work at the United Arab Emirates University from 1997 to 2015. He produced a remarkable body of poetry and critical works during his tenure as a university instructor and his active involvement in cultural and poetic affairs in Sanaa and later in the UAE, which continues to this day.

In this book, Alallaq takes on several roles, including narrator, contemplator, restorer, and descriptor, and expresses himself using elevated literary language. As a result, the work serves as an aesthetic testament to the purity of language as well as a cohesive account of the ups and downs of daily life. Despite living and working in a prosperous and stable environment for many years, he remains emotionally and imaginatively connected to the events and struggles affecting his country and the Arab world. He continues to document his aesthetic and patriotic testimony of current happenings, as clearly evidenced in his present autobiography.

BIOGRAPHY:

Ali Jaafar Alallaq is an Iraqi Poet, critic, and university professor. He received a Ph.D. in Modern Literature and Criticism in the UK in 1984. He is currently a lecturer at the University of Baghdad and Mustansiriyah University, and editor-in-chief of monthly literary magazine Al-Aqlam. From 1991 to 1997, he taught at Sanaa University before moving on to become a professor of modern literature and criticism at UAEU, where he served until 2015.

His book "al-Shi'r wa-al-ta-laqqi" (Poetry and Reception) won the 1997 Sharjah International Book Fair Award for best book in literary creativity. He received the Sultan Bin Ali Al Owais Cultural Award for poetry in 2019, and was honoured by the First Arab Cultural Festival (Istanbul, 2022) for his poetic, critical, and academic achievements.

Alallaq is a member of several literary prize committees, and he has published over 20 books of poetry, the most recent of which include "Farashat Litabdeed Alwihda" (Butterflies to Ward Off Loneliness) and "Ila Ayn Ayyathouha Al Kaseedah" (Where to, O Poem? An Autobiography).



Anyone could be guilty in this murder mystery, set in the wake of Algeria's War of Independence

On a nice fall day of 1988, Zakiya Zaghwani was found lying dead at the edge of the desert, giving way to a quest to discover the circumstances surrounding her death. While looking for whoever was involved in the death of the young singer, nearby residents discover bit by bit their involvement in many things other than the crime itself.

The story takes place in a town near the desert. And as with Khatibi's previous novels, this one is also marked by a tight plot, revolving around the murder of a singer who works in a hotel. This sets off a series of complex investigations that defy easy conclusions and invite doubt about the involvement of more than one character.

Through the narrators of the novel, who also happen to be its protagonists, the author delves into the history of colonialism and the Algerian War of Independence and its successors, describing the circumstances of the story whose events unfold throughout the month. As such, the characters suspected of killing the singer are not only accused of a criminal offense, but are also concerned, as it appears, with the great legacy that the War of Independence left, from different aspects.

The novel looks back at a critical period in the modern history of Algeria that witnessed the largest socio-political crisis following its independence in 1988. While the story avoids the immediate circumstances of the war, it rather invokes the events leading up to it and tracks its impact on the social life, while capturing the daily life of vulnerable and marginalized groups.

Nonetheless, those residents' vulnerability does not necessarily mean they are innocent. As it appears, they are all involved in a crime that is laden with symbolism and hints at the status of women in a society shackled by a heavy legacy of a violent, wounded masculinity. This approach to addressing social issues reflects a longing to break loose from the stereotypical discourse that sets heroism in a pre-defined mold and reduces the truth to only one of its dimensions.

COMMENTARY ON HIS PRIZE-WINNING BOOK, 'THE END OF THE DESERT'

This novel isn't limited to one central story. Each of its characters has their own story pouring into the main one, all intertwined in a sequence of events that unveils the destiny of each of the characters, unfolding life as lived in Algeria, but also in other Arab countries as well that have been through similar transformations.

This novel seeks to create a modern form of writing, inspired by a common heritage. It attempts to use literature as a reflection of reality and



its changes. The 1980s, when the novel's events take place, saw the beginnings of the disintegration of the concept of society and the emergence of a new period, that of "single individuals" (as evident in each of the characters' paths). The title in itself "The End of the Desert" is meant to highlight both the spatial context of the events (at the edge of the dessert of Algeria) and the end of a period and the beginning of a new one.

One also must not lose sight of the effort of this novel to convey knowledge in its recalling of the War of Independence and all that followed it, notably the psychological changes in the hearts of those who survived it.

It's a story about the relationship between the East and the West, in an interchange with the novel The Sheik by the British orientalist, Edith Maude Hulland. It puts the location of the events at the centerstage, telling the story of the place and its historical weight. It goes inside and outside the difference places, from a house to a cafe, to a hotel, and a prison, all while allocating an important space to the presence of women in a society that hasn't yet recovered from its brokenness, highlighting their resilience despite all the alienation they experienced where they lived.

It's also a story that celebrates life, given the multitude of its characters, from the intellectual to the marginalized and despairing, whose voice is often not heard. This polyphony reflects the social pluralism and historical transformation of the location where the events novel take place.

BIOGRAPHY:

Said Khatibi is an Algerian writer born in December 29, 1984 in Bou Saada. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in French literature from the University of Algiers, then obtained a master's degree in cultural studies from Sorbonne Nouvelle University Paris 3. He has published translations, including Baiidan 'an Nejma (a translation of the poetry of Kateb Yacine) and Madar El Ghiyab (an anthology of Algerian short stories written in French). He also participated in the translation of "The Encyclopedia of African Cinema". He published A'ras El Nar (on Raï music), and his book Abartou El Massa' Hafiyan included dialogues with key Francophone writers.

To date, Khatibi has released four novels: Kitab Al Khataya (The Book of Faults, 2013); Arba'oun Aman Fi Intizar Isabelle (Forty Years Waiting for Isabelle, 2016); Hatab Sarajevo (Firewood of Sarajevo, 2018); and Nehayat Al Sahra'a (The End of the Desert, 2022); in addition to a book about his travels, titled Jana'en El Sharq Al Multahiba (The Inflamed Heavens of the East, 2015).

He has been active in cultural journalism since 2006, and has worked and lived in Slovenia since 2016. He has a cultural column published every Saturday in Al-Quds Al-Arabi newspaper.

He was awarded the Arab Journalism Award, Ibn Battuta Prize for Travel Literature, and the Katara Prize for Arabic Novel, and has been shortlisted for the International Prize for Arabic Fiction (IPAF).



A look back at an iconic place in Cairo and an important era of transformation in Egypt

The book opens a unique door to the history of Cairo and its journey from a social and cultural perspective and aims to build a new and different narrative for this history—one that shows Cairo as a cosmopolitan, multicultural city.

Cairo's Cafe Riche has a deep cultural history and a broad creative and social heritage. Saqer describes it as "the site where endless friendships are established between the café and history."

Saqer's narrative is not just about the small café, but rather constitutes observance and analysis of the presence of this café in the history of Egypt and how we can view many events surrounding it.


Here there is no separation between the political and the cultural, between the historical, the social, and the artistic.

The book combines history and narrative, which makes it a documented historical biography on the one hand and a creative work on the other. It also documents an important era in Egypt's cultural history by examining the cultural and social transformations in modern Egyptian history and highlighting prominent intellectuals and creators associated with the cafe and the history of intellectual life in Egypt.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR:

Maisoon Sager is a poet, novelist and artist who has published several collections of poetry in classical Arabic and has previously won the C.P. Cavafy International Prize for Poetry. 'In the Footsteps of Enayat Al-Zayyat' traces the life of Egyptian writer Enayat Al-Zayyat, who died in 1963, four years before the release of her only novel. Instead of a traditional biography, this narrative searches for a young woman whose family burned all her personal documents, including the draft of her second novel.

Mersal combines different writing techniques such as fictional narration, academic research, interviews, fiction, and fragments of the autobiography of the author of the novel.

The book deals with important political, social and cultural issues. We read about the history of psychiatry in modern Egypt, divorce and the continued suffering of women with the Personal Status Law, the changing geography of Cairo alongside changes in political regimes. In the library of the German Archaeological Institute, where Enayat worked, we find her unpublished second novel and unknown stories of German scientists fleeing Nazism to Cairo. We also see how Enayat's neglected tomb reveals the life story of her great-grandfather, Ahmed Rashid Pasha, and the disasters buried in the genealogy tree.

Egyptian poet, writer, academic and translator Iman Mersal works as an Associate professor of Arabic literature and Middle Eastern studies at the University of Alberta, Canada and currently resides in Marseille, France, where she holds the Albert Camus chair at IMéRA, the Institute for Advanced Study of Aix-Marseille University until July 2021, while working on a book entitled Al Laknah: Al Sawt fee Ghair Makaneh (Accent: the Displaced Voice). An anthology of her works was translated into more than twenty languages and she has five poetry collections published. Rich in artistic, philosophical, literacy and historic values, Ouhaibi's poems offer readers rich experiences, not just poetically but with the imparting of crucial knowledge, too, as his writing is steeped in his own extensive personal experiences.

The Penultimate Cup begins with an autobiographical piece entitled "The Family", in which the poet chronicles his ancestral home and gives an account of his family life and childhood before poetry. "The Family" becomes a venue where his family members—those who influenced him the most—arrive in succession: his father, the village chief; his grandfather, the astrologer; his uncle, the chess player; his mother and the rest. The places where he lived fashion the corners of the poem like furniture.



"The Scream" poem for example, relates not to the sound of a person in pain but his image, which reminds the reader of the famous painting by Norwegian artist Edvard Munch. "Oh Youssef," writes Ouhaibi, "take my hand, while I scream like Munch in the wilderness".



Himmich opens his book with a discussion on autobiographical writing, followed by chapters on the author's early life, starting with his childhood in Meknes. The heroic figures of his "rebellious youth" are Marx and Sartre, and the challenges of these and other radical thinkers, in both Arabic and European languages, find their way into his doctoral thesis, Ideological Patterns in Islam: Ijtihad and History (in Arabic, 1990).

Subsequent chapters move into the domain of creation, with four categories reflecting the author's literary, intellectual, linguistic, and cultural interests. Starting with an epigraph of Italo Calvino, the "literary" chapter focuses on the novel, its history, and its complexities.

The penultimate chapter entitled "My Polemics" offers four of his own polemical stands: on fundamentalist trends—specifically Islam and "Islamism"; on the prevalence in Moroccan publications of the Latin alphabet; and issues with the well-known littérateurs Adonis and Youssef Ziedan.

The work closes with the author's reflection on the emergence of a new and negative cultural "hegemony", the awareness of which he attributes to Edward Said and the latter's interpretation of the work of Franz Fanon.



A tragic father-son story during the Arab Spring explores religious extremism and masculinity.

The novel opens with a letter from Ghassan to his cousin, describing how his father Massoud strangled his mother to death when Ghassan was just three years old. Afterward, Massoud flees the village in southern Lebanon. For 18 years, no one hears from him.

Meanwhile, Massoud has moved to southern Syria, where he remarried and had two more sons. During the Arab Spring, the militant groups fighting the Syrian regime transform him into a religious extremist.

In the second half of the novel, Massoud return to the village in southern Lebanon. He brings with him a group of men. Together they seize control of the village and terrorize its inhabitants. They begin murdering the villagers in the name of religion. One of Ghassan's friends is among the victims. He decides that he must kill his father, avenging the death of his friend and the deaths of the other villagers. In the end, he fails and is beheaded by Bushra's son, his cousin, who is has joined Massoud's thugs.

Beydoun captures the shifting points of view in a family shattered by the tyranny of normative masculinity and the resulting violence. The victims are women, of course, but also the men like Ghassan who reject these social and cultural expectations. The novel also portrays the rise of religious extremism and the terrorism it can inspire, which wreaks havoc on the lives of ordinary people.

Abbas Beydoun is well known in the Arab world as a poet, journalist, and literary critic. He was born in the village of Sur in southern Lebanon in 1945 to a family passionate about literature. He studied Arabic Literature at Beirut Arabic University and received his master's degree in literature in Sorbonne. France.

Beydoun started his writing career as a poet and has published numerous poetry collections, including Critique of Pain, Overdose of Time, Glass Graveyards, Chambers, A Ticket for Two, and The Metaphysics of the Fox.

The Boy Who Saw the Color of Air is also a book about Lebanon and its treatment of people with disabilities as well as the unique religious and cultural environment of Beirut.

Wazen's lucid language and the linear structure he employs result in a coherent and easy-to- read narrative. The Boy Who Saw the Color of Air is an important contribution to a literature in which people with disabilities are underrepresented. In addition to offering a story of empowerment and friendship, this book also aims to educate readers about people with disabilities and shed light on the indispensable roles played by institutions like the Institute.

Abdo Wazen was born in Beirut, Lebanon in 1957. In addition to writing poetry and novels, he's a French-to-Arabic translator and the well-known culture editor of Al-Hayat newspaper.


